Overview of Developments

- Strategic work across SWL
- 0-25 approaches being developed for health services to support wider SEND expectations
- All age reviews of mental health, learning disability and autism services being undertaken
- Local Mental Health Trust implementing a community transformation plan which includes transitions as a key theme and project element
- Strategic work within Richmond
- 2 significant policies will be updated this year: 'Minding the GAP' the children's safeguarding boards health and wellbeing protocol and the South West London & St George's CAMHS transitions policy.
- Review of our therapies provision and updating them to include specific 'transitions' requirements
- Multi agency and specific strategic groups (i.e. Workstream 6) developed
- Operational work within Richmond
- Multi agency transitions pathways now developed and 'transitions group' now implemented
- Continuing care and continuing healthcare processes tightened
- Learning Disability & Autism priorities being progressed with key partners including combining the dynamic support register (CYP) and enhanced care register (Adults) and 14years+ annual health checks



Anonymous Transitions Case Study

- A young person aged 21, who has range of complex needs including Cerebral Palsy, epilepsy and learning disabilities, she is a communication aid user and has been attending a specialist residential school.
- Transition planning has been taking place but required joint planning of AfC SEND team ,Social Care and the CCG as she meets criteria for Continuing Health care.
- Parental preference and the young person's preference is a residential placement with educational input. In addition she has a range of therapeutic needs (SALT, OT and Physio) which must be delivered in accordance with her EHCP. It is likely that these will need to be spot commissioned, which raises question of sourcing providers. This has also led to some practical challenges including use of mobility car.
- Challenge around identifying suitable adult provision which meets needs across Education, Health and Care



Learning from this case study

- Cross system understanding of the different frameworks and policy implications (Education, Health and Care Plans and the CHC framework)
- Clarity of roles and responsibilities (of organisations and individuals) in coordinating and managing transition
- Need to work together across the system earlier to plan suitable provision which reflects the complexity of need and ensures delivery of provision described in a joined up, comprehensive EHCP
- Need to embed the Preparation for Adulthood framework early to support the young person and family to consider options



Key elements of health pathways within wider transitions work

- Transition pathways and protocol in place on council website, based on extensive collaboration across agencies/teams.
- Pathways articulated for social care, education, health, leaving care and transport. To be reviewed and updated annually if required.
- Additional information available on council website and AfC's local offer, including a short animated film with voiceovers from young people with SEND.
- Information on multi agency panels relevant to transition also due to be added to above soon.
- Quarterly transition meeting focused on young people with complex needs in place with CCG, social care and education.
- Developing the use of (consented) 'tracker' information to inform commissioning (health and social care) with particular focus on accommodation solutions, residential and/or supported living.
- Renewed focus and discussion on young people who fall through the gaps at transition and may not meet health eligibility criteria for more specialist services.



Transitions for health therapies

- Hounslow Richmond Community Health Services (HRCH) have undertaken a review of all their pathways across therapies. This includes Speech & Language, Occupational Therapy and Physiotherapy.
- Pathways include transitions at key stages from early years to reception, primary school to secondary etc.
- Pathways additionally include post 16 and 18+ arrangements with specific review points and in the context of the young persons situation and educational placement.
- HRCH also provide a range of other specialist services and support across
 Richmond and are supporting the development of transitions within these
 services such as children looked after.
