

# Dynamic Support Register

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# What is the Dynamic Support Register?



- The Dynamic Support register is a register of all children and young people (14 and over) with ASC and/or LD for whom there are concerns that their needs could escalate to the point of requiring a Care Education and Treatment Review/being admitted to a learning disability or mental health in-patient setting.
- The aim is to keep an oversight of an individual's wellbeing and the support they are receiving to ensure that they are able to remain in the community and do not return to an in-patient setting.



# What is the Dynamic Support Register?

- Each ICS (place) is required to hold a dynamic register of all people with LD and/or autism who are considered to be at risk of admission to hospital.
- The register is intended to identify those people who are likely to require a Community Care and Treatment review or Care Education and Treatment Review to prevent their unnecessary admission, or to ensure that if admission is required it is for the shortest possible time and has clear outcomes.
- At a population level the register can be used to inform the commissioning of support services and at an individual level it will identify those who may go on to or are starting to display behaviour that challenges with the aim of improving service design and enable early intervention.
- Each ICS (place) should establish a Risk Register Group which will be responsible for working at an operational and strategic level to develop and maintain the dynamic register. In Kingston and Richmond we have an established adult register and a developing children's register.



# Factors that may place someone at risk of admission

- Unstable untreated mental illness
- Previous history of admission
- Escalating significant behaviour that challenges
- Having no fixed address
- Having no effectively planned transition
- Those in receipt of Youth Offending Services
- Being supported in an unstable environment by a changing staff team, which may include educational and social care provisions
- Being a child looked after or a care leaver with reduced support networks



# Escalating risk

- Where someone is placing themselves or others at serious and or significant risk of harm
- Where the individual's placement or home situation is at risk of irretrievable breakdown, and where this would pose a significant risk to the safety of the person and or others
- Where hospital admission is being considered as an option
- Where people have had an unplanned hospital admission or been managed by a crisis team to prevent a hospital admission in the last year.
- Previous Tier 4 admission



# Local Current Process

- CAMHS notification to CCG of a young person at risk of admission
- Explicit consent is required from CYP and/or parent/guardian for a child to be added to the register
- Blue Light Care, Education and Treatment Review may be convened to look at level of risk and support.
- Full Care, Education and Treatment review may be required (expert by experience and professional expert) which will provide recommendations
- Review of recommendations and implementation
- Register held



# Local intention- move to prevention

In Kingston and Richmond, children and young people may be identified as being at risk of a potential hospital admission through one the following routes:

- Continuing Care Panel
- Joint Agency Panel
- Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Panel
- CAMHS service
- Allocation and Resource panel
- Discussion about adding CYP to support register ( with consent)
- Intention to establish multiagency DSR meetings on a monthly basis to review both those at immediate risk of admission but also those CYP where concerns are escalating and proactive response required.
