Short Breaks

Short Breaks Short Breaks are a range of play and leisure services for disabled children and young people. The services are available for people who live in Barnet, between 0 -19 (birthday) who need additional support to access play and leisure services. The new offer for families in Barnet is:

• 15 days or 90 hours using Barnet approved provider list

• £1200 funding via pre-paid card to allow families choice and flexibility of services (subject to a 0 to 25 service funding policy and Short Breaks written agreement).

No need to re-apply if the service has been allocated the previous year as this will be renewed automatically. This was decided thanks to the parents feedback.

We have a variety of organisations providing short break services and trying to create also new alternatives.

Spotlight on our Short Breaks Coordinator

I am Carla Visone, the Short Breaks Coordinator in Barnet. I joined the 0-25 Disabilities team 5 years ago. I studied Business and Economics and completed my Master's in Communication; I am also an accredited Associate Project Manager. I speak



four languages and have worked in different fields where I developed organisational and customer care skills.

My first job in Social Care eight years ago, was in the Mash Team. This was a wonderful and very intense experience. It was where I learned to recognise signs of potential safeguarding concerns, how to work effectively with other Departments and the Police and developed knowledge on how to support families, whilst being sensible to their personal history and needs.

I am proud of our service and It has been amazing seeing the Short Breaks Service develop and improve becoming more accessible and flexible according to family's needs, especially thanks to parent and young people's feedback. I love my job and enjoy visiting the provisions that we fund during holidays and seeing the enjoyment from our service users; their smiles mean the world to me.







Open Spaces Scheme

Running since summer 2020, the Open Spaces Scheme has gone from strength to strength and so far this year has been used by almost one hundred families. The scheme is open to all families of a child with SEND and allows them unsupervised access to exciting play venues within the borough, including the Greentop Centre in Colindale (NW9) and Oakleigh Park School of Swimming's pool in Whetstone (N20).

At the Greentop Centre, children can burn off excess energy in the outdoor play area, which includes a large grassy area with climbing frames and slides as well as access to the basketball court, which is perfect for scooters and roller skates. On wet days there's a fantastic indoor games room with fun activities including table football tables, while the sensory area is popular whatever the weather. Two friendly staff are on hand to check each family into the centre and clean the space between sessions. Over at Oakleigh Park School of Swimming families have exclusive use of the pool, enjoying a calm and quiet atmosphere which helps even the most anxious swimmers feel confident about taking a dip.





Parents have given positive feedback about both venues, explaining that the scheme allows them to enjoy family activities away from home, without the usual stresses of leaving the house together.

All activities are unsupervised, with parents / carers responsible for looking after children during their session.

Interview with Aisha Tijani, Team Manager of Specialist Autism Team (SAT)

0-25 Disabilities Team

Can you give a brief overview of the role of the SAT:

We work with high functioning young people with autism who also present with co-morbidities relating to their mental health, mostly around the areas of depression, anxiety disorder, self-harming behaviours, Oppositional Defiance Disorder (ODD), obsessive compulsive disorder (OCD), Post Trau-

matic Stress Disorder (PTSD), Pathological Demand Avoidance (PDA) as well as other psychotic difficulties, undiagnosed conditions as well as children with ADHD. The young people we work with are complex and are assessed as creating a risk to self and/or others with the potential of family and/or placement breakdown.

Many of the young people we work with are in mainstream school and the profile we often see is late diagnosis of Autism. With the late diagnosis, they may be on the cusp of hospital admission and are likely to be known to the Adolescent Crisis Team at CAMHs as their mental health has significantly deteriorated needing further assessment to meet their needs.

What other agencies do you work closely with?

We work intensively with CAMHs (including TCAPS and specialist hospital settings), Education (SEN, SENDIASS, BEAM), Autism Advisory Teachers (AAT) and we have many other teachers and agencies involved with these young people. When they are in the hospital, we collaborate with the teams around discharge planning, putting in a care plan in the community and collaborating with those professionals around risk assessments and safety planning.

We also work very closely with an agency which is for the whole of London which is called the ADITT team. We also work with the CCG commissioners and CAMHs because many of the young people require a multi-agency response and co-ordination; it is very complex and specialist work and involves assessing risk and developing complex care plans within the community to prevent young people to go into hospitals or to support them to come out of hospital and to stay in the community longer term.

Do the SAT work with a particular age range?

We usually see young people from year 6 onwards and many of them have found the transition from one provision to the next challenging and that is when the anxiety level and changes in behaviour increases and they get stuck and this creates challenges for parents supporting them or within the new setting where they find themselves to be struggling with the change. We are getting referrals for younger children as well and we need to look at the early support for families across Social Care.

0-25 Disabilities Team (continued)

What is the criteria for a young person to open to SAT?

The process of referral is to go through MASH where an assessment or support is required. MASH will look at the referral and where they feel it meets our threshold for the SAT team, the MASH officers come to me for case consultations and when meeting criteria, we can agree for the case to step up. I also do case consultations with Social Workers within Barnet as having autism, does not mean you automatically open to SAT and they can sit within other teams; most of the time, guidance and signposting is required.

Are all of the young people you work with on a Child In Need Plan?

We have the highest numbers of CIN plans in the service and most of our young people we work with are on Child In Need Plans (CIN) and we do also work with young people on a Child Protection Plan (CP) as well as Looked After Children (LAC).

What are your main aims as a service?

The purpose of the scheme is to close the gaps and ensure the right support is in place for the young person early to prevent a placement breakdown and prevent a young person going into care. The level of crisis we have seen since the lockdown and the complexities of such sometimes we have no other option but to support the young person with a residential placement. These therapeutic placements, due to risk factors and mental health are through the recommendations made by the clinicians and health; this is supported by the Social Care Assessment.

How does your team fit into the wider 0-25 team and Social Care for the London Borough of Barnet?

Our team is three social workers, one advanced practitioner and one team manager however, we are all working together; the 0-18 CWD team, the Transition Team and we have case allocations meetings on Friday to look at the cases coming in and agree the pathway and most appropriate team. We also support our 0-18 team with complex cases which require specialist support and case direction using specialist knowledge and experience of the SAT. We share about new developments within the Autism Pathway or health especially around the Transforming Care and Dynamic Support Register or around complex health and medical panels.

In the wider team, I also offer case consultations, case discussions, and attend meetings to support Social Workers in other teams where possible. I am also part of the Resources for Autism pilot working alongside Early Help.
