Tell us what you think about transitions from children to adult health services

Working with the Barnet Parent Carer Forum, we are looking to improve communication and processes around transitions from Paediatric to Adult Health Services in Barnet for young people with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND). We will be holding focus group sessions with young people and their families who have recently or will soon go through transition from children to adult health services. Focus groups will be held in the week commencing 25 June and aim to get your views about how we can improve the process of transition and communicate accurate and timely information about transitions in health services. There will also be surveys circulated for young people and parents to complete prior to focus groups taking place.

Update from Education

Within SEND and Inclusion we have been trying hard to ensure that there is an extensive offer for our Barnet parent community (e.g. training events, workshops, dropins). Also, we are aiming to increase the levels of participation and coproduction with regards to how we design, implement and review our service delivery.

Our parent drop-in initiative started with our Specialist Inclusion Services and Educational Psychology Team. The aim was to provide a regular opportunity for Barnet parents to access a 1:1 session with a professional to discuss any aspect of a concern or issue they may have (to help move the situation forward). These sessions have been hosted by schools and settings across the borough and they occur on a 6 week cycle. Overtime this project has generated interest and grown; we now have professionals across education, health and social care contributing to this initiative. We have asked all parents who access the sessions to provide feedback, which has been overwhelmingly positive so far. We have also ensured parents' feedback informs future planning and development of the drop-in sessions.

New integrated therapies service in Barnet



The new Children and Young People (CYP) Therapies team will bring together staff from Speech and Language Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Physiotherapy to provide services for children and young people aged 0-19 across Barnet, and up to 25 years for young people with an EHCP, bringing all these services under one provider.

From 1 September 2018 Barnet's Speech and Language Therapy, Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy, including Social Care OT will be joining North East London Foundation Trust (NELFT). NELFT already provide an extensive range of integrated community and mental health services for people living in the London boroughs of Barking & Dagenham, Havering, Redbridge and Waltham Forest and community health services for people living in the south west Essex areas of Basildon, Brentwood and Thurrock.

The priority of The London Borough of Barnet and Barnet Clinical Commissioning Group was to secure the best possible service for Barnet children, young people and their families. NELFT has been appointed following a comprehensive procurement which saw each bid evaluated against a range of criteria which focused heavily on the quality of service which will be provided and how the provider will engage and involve children, young people and their families in their health care. CYP Therapies will continue to provide support, resources and advice to parents, early years settings and schools.

In selecting a new provider, both organisations have worked with our local community to deliver a truly joined-up, seamless accessible service that will deliver value for money and meet people's needs. This is designed to improve the overall health of children, young people and their families in Barnet. All the organisations involved will work closely together in the run up to early September to make sure that the service transfers smoothly without disruption for our children and young people.

Over the next few weeks and months regular updates on developments including telephone numbers, email addresses and the new referral form will also be made available.

A representative from NELFT will also be at the SEND conference on 14 June and will be able to answer your questions and provide more information about the integrated therapies service.
