SEND Local Offer: Rethink, Refresh, Reboot

The **brand new** Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) **Local Offer website** has launched successfully. The site is where everyone can find out about services for children and young people and their families across the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead.

The new web address is:

www.rbwm.afcinfo.org.uk/local_offer. There are a whole host of new things, from **Google Maps** function when searching in the directory. To a 'what's on calendar' listing all the events from around the Borough. Users will need to update their favourite bookmarks as the old site will no longer be available.

We will be rolling out further sections over the coming months such as the expanded **Young People's website**. The final section will be the **Community Information area**. This will provide information for the wider community of parents, carers and community partners including childcare providers



The Local Offer brings together information about services for children and young people (0-25)with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and their families, helping you to see what services are available and how to access them.

The register enables services to:

with disabilities and their parents/ carers.

- Identify gaps in provision for children and young people with disabilities and their parents or carers
- Plan services to meet the needs of children and young people with disabilities and their parents or carers
- Plan work around the Year 9 Transition Review (for children who have an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP)
- Plan services for when children and young people with disabilities leave school

The register also forms the basis of a mailing list to inform and consult with children and their parents or carers about new and existing services, gaps in services, changes to benefits, holiday schemes and other activities.

Registration is on a voluntary basis and no child or young person will be registered without parental consent. Registration is not required in order to receive any services. However, the more that is known about children and young people with disabilities in RBWM, the more effectively services can be planned. Please note that registration does not mean that a child or young person is eligible for services. To be included on the register, a child or young person should be:

- under 25
- Resident in RBWM or the responsibility of RBWM
- Able to be registered under one of the primary disability categories

Primary disability categories:

- Autistic Spectrum Disorder
- Behavioural, emotional and social difficulties (for example ADHD, ODD)
- Developmental delay
- Hearing impairment
- Learning difficulty/disability
- Medical
- Multiple sensory impairment (such as hearing and sight loss)
- Physical disability
- Profound and multiple learning difficulties (PMLD)
- Speech, language and communication difficulties
- Severe learning difficulties
- Visual impairment

Disability Register: Sign up The Disability Register is a list of children and young people aged 0 to 25 who

live within the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead (RBWM) who have a disability and who receive, or may one day need to use the services from health, social services, education or voluntary organisations. This allows us to work more closely together to identify and plan for children and young people



The Max Card: What is it?

The Max Card can be provided to children, young people and young adults (0-25 years), living in the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead, with additional needs, whether it is a physical, sensory, or a learning disability. The Max Card is a 'credit card size' card which can be shown to certain organisations as proof of your child or young person's disability. Families will also benefit from **discounts** at **over 800 attractions** nationwide. A full list of supporting attractions can be seen at <u>My Max Card</u>.

This is a **new service** offered by Achieving for Children, through the Children and Young People Disability Service (CYPDS) and there will be **no personal cost** to families for this card.

When you register for a Max Card the information you provide will:

- → Help us maintain the **Disability Register**
- → Support our planning for future services and identify any gaps in current service provision for children and young people with additional needs.
- → Ensure that families with a child or young person with additional needs are kept fully informed of issues that may affect them, and to advise them of relevant new services and opportunities.

If your child or young person (0-18 years) does not have an EHCP, you will need to provide evidence of your child or young person's additional need/ disability e.g. GP or CAMHS letter or proof of DLA. Adults aged 18 - 25 years who do not have an EHCP, will need to contact Adult Social Care, Optalis.

Inclusion Mark: A way forward

In **September 2018** we began the task of creating an **Inclusion Mark** which would enable schools to demonstrate their **commitment to the Inclusion Charter** through having their inclusive practice recognised and celebrated. This would **support families** (and children and young people) when deciding which school to choose for their child's education. This is such an important decision and one which all parents take seriously, but particularly important if your child has a special educational need.



Since then, a group of **Headteachers and SENCo's** have met to create an **audit tool** which supports this process. The focus has been on the **leadership** of inclusion: the leadership shown by Governors. Headteachers, SENCos, teaching and support staff, families and carers and of course, **children and young people**. The school completes the audit which would then be used as evidence of their inclusive practice through an accreditation process.

It was decided that the accrediting panel created to support this, would be made up of a Local Authority (LA) representative, and importantly, a Headteacher and SENCo from a local school. As well as supporting the accreditation process, this would provide great Continuing Professional Development for these staff. The opportunity to share outstanding inclusive practice across schools in the Borough was seen to be an important element of the accreditation process. The Headteacher and SENCo could vary from one Panel to the next, but the LA representative involved would be the same person, ensuring a level of consistency and moderation.

We trialled what we had created in a couple of schools this term before it is "going live" during the 2019/20 academic year.

We visited a **secondary school** last month and are going into a **primary school** later in June.

The schools are asked to **complete the audit tool** and we also ask that a range of activities take place on the day that we visit. These **include talking to young people** about their school and gauging the views of the **parents / carers** about their experience of the school; crucial to the whole process. In addition, we ask to **meet the SEND governor**, headteacher and a range of other staff. We observe lessons, particularly those in which there are children with **Education Health and Care Plans** to ensure that "reasonable adjustments" are being made and that all pupils are able to access the lesson and make progress.

The trial has already provided **an invaluable insight** to ensure that the process is as robust as we want it to be. By the end of the term we will be in a position to launch the accreditation process and we already have a secondary school who wants us to visit next term to allow then to achieve the Mark.

Why we didn't buy into an existing franchise?

1. It is expensive, school budgets are under real pressure

2. There would be no opportunity for the professional development. Professionals will visit the schools but not RBWM staff which we have already seen the benefit of.

We are looking forward to the launch and getting the process started.

Updates: Preparing for Adulthood & Early Years

The Preparing for Adulthood team have a summer transition scheme they are running for young people who are going to college but have high anxiety. This is in conjunction with other Achieving for Children teams within the borough, such as the Well-being Service, Educational Psychology Service and Youth Services.

The Transition event for young people and their parents/carers is planned to be held on October 10th at the Town Hall. There will be a number of colleges, support agencies and other professionals attending to provide information about education/employment, health, community inclusion and independent living. More information will come out in the near future.

The Early Years SEND team is available to support settings who educate 2 – 4 year olds with all SEND related matters. This year we have supported over 80 children providing practitioners with individualised strategies to help them to access the Early Years curriculum successfully and at a developmentally appropriate level. 45 children have also been allocated Early Years inclusion funding to help meet their individual needs. This funding has been used, for example, to fund the purchase of sensory resources, individual training sessions, speech and language therapy sessions and staff time to carry out interventions such as the Attention Autism programme and Lego therapy.

The team also organised a highly successful conference on Wednesday 5th June for 50 Early Years practitioners from Private, Voluntary and Independent settings and maintained Nursery classes across Ascot, Windsor and Maidenhead. There was a range of diverse workshops on offer including working with parents, smooth transitions for children with ASC and meditation. Other agencies such as SHINE and Parenting Special Children contributed to these.

Feedback was wholly positive with evaluations commenting on how planning first for children with SEND will benefit the provision for all children alongside managing challenging behaviours.
