Inspection of the educational support available for looked after children and care leavers in Camden

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Who are the young inspectors?

Young Inspectors are service users of the Family Services and Social Work (FSSW) Looked After Children service, aged 16 - 19.

Every summer a team of Young Inspectors is selected by the Participation Officer in FSSW. This year the Young Inspectors were asked to inspect the educational support available for looked after children and care leavers.

Why are Young Inspectors doing the inspection?

The main reason for carrying out the inspection is to find out:


- what educational support is available to Camden looked after children and care leavers.
- what is working well.
- what needs to be changed to make the support better.

What did the inspection involve?


The work of the Young Inspectors involved the following tasks:

- Research to find out what the government says children should get and what support Virtual Academies (Looked After Children Education Academies) provide in other authorities.
- Prepare a list of the most important things that (in an ideal world) would make for an excellent education support service.
- Write questions for children, foster carers and social workers to find out what is good about the support offered at present and what should be changed.
- Write interview questions for senior managers of the LAC services and consultants of Camden's LAC Academy and interview those key people who make decisions about services.
- Consultation with children and care leavers, foster carers and social workers using questionnaires at the consultation event.
- Posting and e-mailing questionnaires and collecting views by phoning children and foster carers who could not attend the event.
- Make recommendations for change based on the feedback received in the interviews and consultation.
- Help write a report about the inspection findings for children, foster carers and managers.


WHAT YOUNG PEOPLE SAID ABOUT WHE

WHAT HELPS LOOKED AFTER CHILDREN DO WELL AT SCHOOL / COLLEGE?

Young Inspectors carefully considered what helps looked after children to do well at school or college and identified the following 15 points as most important:

- 1. A place at a good school
- 2. Availability of excellent advice and guidance
- 3. Adults having aspirations for children and young people and helping them to develop their own aspirations
- 4. Good communication between teachers, social workers, professionals and young people
- 5. Learning Mentors

- 6. Friendly, compassionate staff, helping to bring out positive traits and skills
- 7. Additional support at school and outside school such as individual tuition, including primary school, revision courses and homework
- 8. Encouragement and empowerment
- 9. Praise and recognition of achievements throughout their time in education
- Access to excellent facilities and resources, including provision of laptops, books and tutors

- 11. Opportunities for extracurricular activities and educational trips
- 12. Emotional support
- 13. Help in finding jobs, training and apprenticeship schemes
- 14. Career advice and guidance
- 15. Inspirational mentors looking out for CYP in care and giving positive encouragement

Young Inspectors' Key Messages

to help looked after children do well at school or college

The following recommendations are based on the responses received from children, young people, social workers and foster carers:

- **1. To provide support and motivation** for all LAC to help them achieve their goals, not just at GCSE, but also in other qualifications and achievements in non academic subject like sports, music and drama.
- 2. To ensure the availability of individual tuition for children and young people of all ages. Those children who had individual tuition said that they have benefited greatly from the provision.
- **3.** To extend the education section of the Pathway Plan to include the support needed for further and higher education, training and employment. The service should consider implementing an effective PEP for everyone up to the age of 18 and ensuring PEP meetings are held for this age group.
- 4. To have an education specialist assigned to the 16+ service to provide specific help and support for care leavers with education and to maintain contact with the LAC Designated Teacher.
- **5. Clear information** needs to be provided for social workers, foster carers and LAC about what educational support LAC are entitled to.

- **6.** To provide regular training for social workers and foster carers to help them keep up to date with the different types of qualifications available, the education system in the UK and information for social workers about the LAC Academy.
- 7. Foster carers and social workers should reinforce their role of motivating and inspiring LAC to do well educationally and in their interests and activities.
- 8. Social workers, foster carers and LAC highlighted the critical importance of laptops to enable learning.
- **9.** A peer mentoring scheme to be set up to motivate and encourage children and young people to do well in their education and to have goals and ambitions.
- 10. Children and young people in care need to be supported emotionally to ensure they are able to progress educationally and should be praised when they do well.
- 11 Stability of foster placement and continuity of school placement are the best ways to help improve children and young people's chances to do well educationally.
- **12. To have inspirational mentors** looking out for children and young people in care and giving positive encouragement to them.
