Woolmore Primary School: Parents 4 Achievement Supporting Parent Governors
Woolmore Primary School recently took part in the Extended Schools Parents 4 Achievement pilot project. Parents 4 Achievement is designed to help parents develop networks of peer support which enable them to participate more fully in school life and their child's education. Woolmore School decided to promote the role of the governing body and parent governors, with the aim of encouraging more parents to become involved.

During a parent meeting with Frank Solarz from the Local Authority Governor Services and Woolmore school governors, parents were able to ask questions about school governance and find out how they could be involved in supporting its work.

Parents keen to find out more then formed an informal mentor/mentor partnership with a parent governor and met regularly with the support of the Parents 4 Achievement Co-ordinator.

I want to thank Frank Solarz for coming. I was approached to be a governor once and said 'no'! If I had known what I have just learned I would have said 'yes!' (Parent)

I now feel confident enough to go for a parent governor role or get more involved in the school through volunteering. (Parent)

I enjoy being a governor & come to meetings, take an interest in school life. I try to be the 'parent guinea' to find out what other parents are thinking about school so I can share ideas and issues and everyone feels happy. (Parent Governor)



Working Neighbourhood Fund Supporting Parents into Work

The Parental Engagement team has been delivering a number of employment focused programmes in schools and settings around the borough. Courses have been developed to support parents into further learning, training and employment.

Early in December, the Passport to Learning programme held another 'Back to Work Event' at the Parents Centre, Spitalman Street. These events aim to support local parents and residents into employment and training. The latest event welcomed 69 parents, 8 staff members and a number of local residents who gained information and advice on training and employment opportunities. 13 local schools were represented by parents at the event.

Course information from the Idea Stores and Tower Hamlets College was available, as well as information about childcare and childminding in the borough. Advice workers from Career Advice Bureau (CAB) and the Volunteer Centre Tower Hamlets were present to give 1:1 advice and information about benefits and volunteering opportunities available locally.

A job preparation workshop also took place throughout the morning where parents sought advice and practised completing application forms and compiling CVs.

"This workshop has been so helpful for me - I feel more confident about my CV now and know what it should look like" (Parent from Virginia Primary School)

Many schools around Tower Hamlets are celebrating supporting parents back to work this academic year. Bigland Green and St John's Primary schools are very proud about the employment of some of their parents as a direct result of engagement with different programmes in school.

Fathers' Story Week 2010

Fathers' Story Week launched this year and was a fantastic opportunity to get fathers and children to spend time together, supporting their child's learning and development. It also provided an excellent focus for schools to consider how parents are involved in their children's learning, and explore other opportunities for more dads, granddads, brothers and uncles to be involved with children in school - and for whole families to spend quality time together.

Timed to coincide with Fathers' Day, the week ran from 14 - 20 June, with a special 'Bring your Dad to School Day' that took place on Friday 18 June.

This kind of targeted activity is a valuable way to highlight the importance of dads and male carers spending time with their children. It enables schools/settings to encourage more male involvement in school with a view to dads, granddads and all other carers being involved in school life together with their children.

"High levels of interest by a father in his child's schooling and greater direct involvement in their learning, education and schools leads to higher educational qualifications, greater progress and more enjoyment of school" (Goldman, 2005)

26 schools signed up to be part of this week in Tower Hamlets and organised a whole range of valuable opportunities for dads, other male carers, mums, female carers and children to be together. Stepney Partnership and Parental Engagement Team staff worked particularly closely with Rob Williams from the Fatherhood Institute to develop some of the ideas and resources featured on the Fathers' Story Week website. Some Tower Hamlets schools will also be involved in evaluating the week in preparation for this to become an annual event in the future.

Message from Councillor Danny Hassell



'Remarkable progress' was how Ofsted described improvements to children's services at the council. Two years ago when these services were found to be 'inadequate' we set the ambitious goal to get to 'good'. Plenty of people told us it was too ambitious and we might be setting ourselves up for failure; that no other council had made such a jump in such a short period. But Mayor John Biggs was clear – that this was the least children and families in Tower Hamlets deserve – and a huge amount of work was undertaken to transform services. I am so grateful to the work of staff across the council and our partners in achieving 'good' overall and on every sub judgement too!

As a council we recognise the pressures facing families as a result of government cuts and rising hardship. That's why over the summer we delivered our expanded Holiday Childcare Scheme. In addition, we also provided a range of activities to tackle the issue of holiday hunger. Although we were forced to scale back our plans after the Government refused our bid for funding we were still able to provide 21,000 free meals to children.

As we look forward to the autumn, we will be launching our new plans to take forward work the early years (following the successful Mayor's Early Years Summit last year) and a new strategy to map out our work to support young people aged 14-25 to get the skills and information they need to make decisions about their futures. We are determined that every child should have the chance to be successful.

Finally Mayor John Biggs, the Speaker and I were delighted to host an afternoon tea for our Parent and Carer Champions, to thank them for their contribution to making our borough a place where families can thrive.

Tower Hamlets judged 'good' by Ofsted

Ofsted has rated Tower Hamlets Council's Children's Services department as 'good', just two years after it was given an 'inadequate' rating. Inspectors said the achievement represented 'remarkable progress'.

Since then, leaders, managers and staff have worked to deliver good experiences and progress for children and their families.

The inspectors found that there is effective management oversight and improved frontline practice.

A well-coordinated universal and early help provision means that children and families now receive good help when they need it. Children in need benefit from good assessments that inform plans to reduce risk and improve children's circumstances, the report found.

All Together anti-bullying schools

Throughout 2019-2020, the Parental Engagement Team, in partnership with the Anti-Bullying Alliance, is offering schools the opportunity to take part in the All Together Programme, a unique anti-bullying training programme. Parental engagement and stakeholder involvement

During the autumn and spring term, the Parental Engagement Team will be working with school leadership teams, governing bodies, school staff and parents/carers to audit and develop effective home-school communication, engagement and consultation processes.

The team will help explore partnerships with parents/families, the impact on pupil outcomes and evidence to meet Ofsted requirements considering the following:

- How does the school work with parents (particularly the most vulnerable groups) to help them support their child's learning?
- Does the school have a link governor for parental engagement?
- How effective is school engagement and how can this be evidenced?
- Does the school regularly consult with parents? If so, how and when? How does this information feed into the School Development Plan?
- How does the school communicate key information about children's learning to parents? What about those parents who may not read well or do not have close contact with the school?
- How does the school share information/policy regarding the safety and wellbeing of pupils and families?
- How does the school obtain feedback from parents and/or respond to complaints?

Poverty proofing the school day

Poverty Proofing the School Day is an initiative that aims to remove the barriers to learning which exist because of the impact of living in poverty. The idea developed from a project run by Children North East in which children living in poverty said what they most wanted was an end to discrimination at school.

In practical terms, the project involves an audit which is based on a whole school consultation. A distinctive feature of this approach is that all pupils at a school are interviewed. In addition, parents, staff and governors also complete a questionnaire – all with the aim of uncovering institutional and cultural practices which stigmatise pupils who live in poverty.

The project, which has been successfully running in the North East of England since 2013, is now being piloted in a number of Tower Hamlets schools – **Cubitt Town Infants' School, Bonner, Malmesbury, St Paul with St Luke, Lansbury Lawrence and Harbinger** primary schools. To assist with the auditing process, professionals from these schools as well as the Tackling Poverty Programme Team and Parental Engagement Team undertook two days intensive training to prepare them for their roles as Lead and Support Researchers. Colleagues from Toynbee Hall will also be supporting the evaluation of the project.

Family Support practitioners tackle inequality

Inequality starts early. Many disadvantaged children and parents are under-prepared for the transition from home or nursery to school, and this gap only widens as children move through school. Complex family life often leads to poor attendance for children which in turn greatly reduces their educational and life outcomes.

A Family Support Practitioner in school can be a very effective way to help tackle these inequalities. These highly skilled practitioners have direct experience of working with the most complex families and are motivated to maximise educational opportunities and improve life chances. They work closely with school staff and families to tackle challenges affecting children's learning using early help interventions to improve attendance, behaviour, engagement and parenting capacity.

A Family Support Practitioner can help:

- Build relationships with families
- Identify early and refer to specialist services
- Improve communication between parents and school
- Increase support for vulnerable families
- Improve attendance and attainment
- Contribute to Ofsted safeguarding requirements to protect children.

Vulnerable children are more likely to:

- Be affected by domestic violence
- Have special educational needs
- Have parents that need support with school engagement
- Have parents that need support with employment, training or education.

Meet Family Support Practitioner – Rashina Begum

Could you tell us a little about your role as a Family Support Practitioner?

It's such a varied role – one day I could be doing a home visit to a vulnerable family or delivering a parenting programme, the next day I could be making a Social Inclusion Panel referral or delivering a workshop to support parents help with their child's literacy. No two days are the same really.



How do you think a school might benefit from having a Family Support Practitioner?

I think it's such a crucial role for any school. Vulnerable families are sometimes suspicious of school staff and perhaps fearful of asking for help or admitting they are struggling. A Family Support Practitioner takes time to build relationships with these families so it's easier to support them.

What are the challenges you face in this role?

Sometimes I am asked to help deal with tricky issues like parent complaints – like bullying or even community cohesion. These can be challenging, but it's always rewarding when we've come to a solution.

What do you enjoy most about the role?

I love getting to know the different families. I often work with families who may be new to the school or even new to the UK. It's great to be part of their journey as they grow in confidence and settle into the school.

Supporting parents of teenagers

Group Teen Triple P is an evidence-based parenting programme suitable for parents with concerns about their teenager's behaviour or who wish to learn a variety of parenting skills that will promote their teenager's development and potential. It explores parents' wellbeing, positive relationship building and effective parenting strategies. It aims to equip parents with the skills and confidence they need to be self-sufficient and to be able to manage family issues without ongoing support.

Group Teen Triple P is delivered by experienced parenting practitioners over eight weeks to groups of up to 15 parents. Practitioners use a range of teaching resources including film clips and group discussions supported by a workbook. They also share tips for implementing strategies discussed in the group at home. There is support throughout the course by 1-1 telephone coaching.

The programme is offered at various venues across Tower Hamlets by the Parenting Team; they are also currently working in partnership with local Youth Hubs to widen access to parents of teenagers.

Many parents who attend the programme feel overwhelmed by some of the issues they are facing and initially may feel isolated. However, as parents get to know each other, they realise that they are not alone and that the majority of the group face similar degrees of challenge with their teens. Many parents feel more empowered by the end of the programme, saying that they have made progress in their relationships with their children. They also come to realise that during this transition period, effective communication is crucial.

Tower Hamlets launches online parenting support

Triple P Online is a web-based programme that promotes the use of positive parenting practices and offers parents practical approaches to specific situations.

It's for parents who have concerns about their child's behaviour but are more suited to completing a programme online because they may be working or unable to attend group parenting courses. Parents can complete the programme in their own time on a computer, tablet or smartphone.

Triple P Online will be piloted in the borough in the autumn term and made available to parents who have been referred for parenting support.

Reducing parental conflict training

Conflict is a normal part of relationships and family life. Not all conflict is damaging, but the way it manifests can negatively affect a child. For example, when conflict between parents is intense, frequent or poorly resolved, it can harm a child's outcomes regardless of whether the parents are together or separated.

Tower Hamlets Children Services have commissioned a number of training courses to raise awareness about parental conflict.

They will focus on the impact and triggers of conflict between parents and how professionals can support families to resolve conflict constructively.

The courses are aimed at staff who provide early help and prevention – schools, health, police, GPs and voluntary sector services. Schools and those services that see children on a daily basis are encouraged to attend.

Courses include:

- Half day awareness sessions
- One day workshops for frontline practitioners
- One day training for managers
- E-Learning.

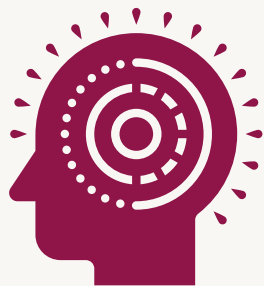

Time to re-think 'Stranger Danger'

We all want our children to be happy and confident. As they get older, we want them to be able to explore the outside and online worlds safely. One of the biggest challenges facing any parent is how to give your child enough freedom to learn for themselves, sometimes from their mistakes, whilst fulfilling that most basic parental duty to keep your children safe.

There's no escaping that worrying things do sometimes happen. Whether it's something suspicious in your local community or a huge national media story, there are times when we need to be able to pick up a conversation with our children, reassure them, and remind them how to stay safe.

The Clever Never Goes campaign states that unfortunately, too many parents and schools are all too often turning to 'stranger danger' to do this and it simply doesn't work. Most strangers would help rather than hurt a child and the people that do want to hurt children are often not strangers. Teaching children to stay safe by focusing on strangers is not helpful in these circumstances.

Clever Never Goes gives parents and teachers a tried and tested replacement for 'stranger danger.' Children are not told to fear the worst of everyone they don't know. They are supported to finely tune their instincts; to spot if someone (anyone) is asking them to go somewhere; and to know what action to take to stay safe. It's designed to be positive, practical, playful and, above all else, to keep things in perspective.

Ministry of Food Cooking Sessions

Busier lives mean that fewer families are getting a chance to cook and eat together. Parents from **Marnar** and **St Elizabeth primary schools** have been discovering how the simple act of preparing and sharing food together can enrich relationships and be a bonding experience.

Parents from both schools took part in a special cooking course called 'Ministry of Food' delivered by skilled practitioners from the Parental Engagement Team. During the course, the parents were encouraged as they made small changes to improve the health of their family.

Many of the parents reported a change in their cooking and eating habits as they discovered how easy it is to prepare cost-effective, home-cooked meals from scratch. The course introduced the parents to new ingredients and cooking methods while exploring issues such as portion size and mindful eating.

Healthy eating principles were a key feature of the course and parents enjoyed trying out recipes from around the world that were low in salt, sugar and fat.

Get ready for fireworks season!

With the fireworks season approaching, it's important to follow guidelines and stay safe.

The law says you must not set off or throw fireworks in public places. You can be fined up to £5,000 and imprisoned for up to 6 months for selling or using fireworks illegally.

It's against the law to sell fireworks to people under 18 and illegal to set off fireworks between 11pm and 7am, except on certain occasions like Bonfire Night, New Year's Eve, Diwali and Chinese New Year.

Buying fireworks

You should only buy fireworks from registered sellers on these dates:
15 October to 10 November
26 to 31 December
3 days before Diwali and Chinese New Year

Stay Safe

- Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves
- Never give a sparkler to a child under 5
- Keep fireworks in a closed box
- Follow the instructions on each firework
- Light them at arm's length using a taper
- Stand well back
- Never go back to a lit firework
- Never throw fireworks
- Keep pets indoors

Summer Holiday Childcare Scheme 2019

The Tower Hamlets Holiday Childcare Scheme (HCS) is Ofsted registered and provides affordable childcare for children aged 3 to 13 years old. The holiday provision takes place in Tower Hamlets schools and operates during the school holidays (excluding the Christmas break).

The scheme also supports working parents who can book extended hours from 8am-6pm, as well as the standard 9am-5pm option.

This year, the summer holiday scheme took place at St Mary and St Michael Primary School and was expanded to provide more places than ever before.

A number of places were provided for a number of places booked for children with SEND and vulnerable referrals from Children's Social Care, schools and other partner agencies.



Early Years

The early years area has been very busy this summer with lots of fun filled activities and local trips. There have been lots of new children to the scheme who have been supported to settle in through our new keyworker animal groups.

Carnival costume making and baking have been popular amongst the children. Children in the early years attended trips to Mudchute Farm and the Peter Rabbit Trail at Basildon.

Staff also supported children who will be transitioning to the main scheme.

Main Scheme

Children in the main scheme have been on the highest number of local trips ever at the 2019 summer scheme. This was organised based on feedback received from parents and children at previous schemes.

Holiday Childcare Scheme – Good Ofsted inspection!

The Tower Hamlets Holiday Childcare Scheme (HCS) had an unannounced Ofsted inspection visit over the summer. This was on one of the busiest days of the summer with 230 children booked to attend. The scheme also had two trips taking place at Mile End Water Festival and King Edward Memorial Park. Alongside this, children in the teen space were visiting Limehouse Youth Hub.

Ofsted rated the Holiday Childcare Scheme as 'good' following the inspection.

The scheme will be reviewing the recommendations from the report and will begin implementing these for the October holiday scheme.

- Staff provide a range of interesting and exciting activities, which means that children behave well and are fully engaged.
- Staff are warm and caring; they take great efforts to form good attachments with children in each key group. Children settle well and feel confident to make friends and are helpful to each other.
- The setting is highly inclusive, and leaders work extensively to provide additional support to families who have children with special educational needs (SEN).
- Safeguarding is effective. Leaders have robust systems in place, which means that staff know how to identify children who may be at risk of harm or abuse.
- Children share their ideas and suggestions to help staff plan daily activities and make changes to the learning environment.
- Staff have high expectations for behaviour and model good behaviour well. Therefore children show kindness and respect to each other and are able to manage their own emotions.
