

HOW TO DO IT

TOO DIFFICULT?

The simpler the rhythm or the action, the easier it will be for the child to copy. Make sure that the child can easily handle the instrument/object. Put your hand over their hand to help them get the simple rhythm.

TOO EASY?

Make the rhythm more complicated, e.g. two quick claps, then a slower one. Let the child know when you've finished by saying "Your turn".
