

- Involve Kingston is a group of people who have learning disabilities who work for Kingston Council.
- We speak up for people who have a learning disability and have meetings with friends once a month to find out how they are feeling and to talk about different things like online safety. These are called friends' chats. To join a friends' chat email: katy.bessent@kingston.gov.uk
- People living in Kingston with a learning disability, aspergers and autism can contact Involve if they have had a problem or are not treated fairly, Involve can take their problem to one of the meetings they go to e.g. Transport, Hospital or Job centre.

Kingston Hospital - Learning Disability Liaison Practitioner




Gracie Holt is now working at Kingston hospital and can help to:

About Easy Read



Easy read is using simple words and pictures so it is easier for people to understand.

Involve makes a document, leaflet or poster that is hard to read with lots of hard words, into a document with simple words (no jargon) and pictures (easy read).



You can email Involve with a document. We can change it to make it easier to read and then send it back to you.

If you would like any changes after it is made in easy read, we can do this as well.

Connected Kingston is a website with lots of useful information for people with learning disabilities like clubs, activities and information services. You can click here to find out more. There is a calendar of activities here.


Involve is working to make it more easy to understand and make the words easier to read.

Transport Meeting

Involve goes to a Transport meeting with Transport for London (TFL) online at the moment.

At the meeting, people with learning disabilities from West London and East London boroughs talk about what they think of public transport.

Involve goes to the meeting to find out what is new and what is happening and to give their views about the things such as the ramp not working or the bus driver driving off before the person sits down.

Mario feeds back to the team, what is important.

Katie enjoys working at the charity shop, she is getting more confident day by day. One day she was working on the till and a man came in without wearing a face mask over his face.

Katie is not very confident usually. But this time she was confident, she went to the man and asked him why he didn't have a mask on.

Katie said to the man you need to wear a face mask in the shop unless exempt, if not can you leave please. The man left.

Katie was proud about this and happy that she had done something good.


This is very important to wear a face mask in the shops, if you are not exempt (it means you don't have to wear a face mask, but you have to prove it with an exemption card around your neck).

Katie helps with the easy read documents and friends' chats. She is the lead for activities on Connected Kingston.
