New opening of Summerhill Cycle Track encourages stakeholder involvement from the sector

Work has now commenced on the new activity area at the former overflow carpark area at Summerhill Country park

The fenced and floodlit track is aimed at encouraging everyone – whatever their ability – to cycle more safely and more often.

Once construction is complete (Expected by May), the project will also support people to further develop their cycling skills in track and BMX, in partnership with several local clubs.

The visitor centre will also be open to reflect the opening times of the track and the cafe area

The comprises of:

- A 750-metre "free-form" tarmac, fenced and floodlit cycle track incorporating varying elevations and degrees of cornering difficulty
- A dedicated balance bike and learn-to-ride area, for younger people keen to learn new skills
- Spectator fencing and a warmup/cool down area on the existing BMX track
- Two secure cycle storage containers

HBC, VCS and sports organisations came together last week to talk through the development of the activity and discuss plans for a launch in May 2022.

Jan has a busy schedule with the Monthly Save Money Hartlepool campaign, helping to put money back in the pockets of the people of Hartlepool through budgeting, healthy eating, food, fuel and internet issues. Two of these events will be held, the first at Belle Vue- Feb 23rd and the Supporters Club after. As well as March 23rd at the Clippy Club. Housing Heroes is taking place to provide help to residents with paying bills and food shopping. Warm Handover is a scheme where people attending the Job Centre can receive help from experts while making their claim, while also assisting job coaches to better understand their clients while helping them.

Recent research



The New Economics Foundation's recently published report "Closing the Divide: How to really level up the UK" suggests that five shifts in social & economic policy are needed to "level up" those areas of the country that have suffered most from regional imbalances in prosperity – such as Hartlepool.

First, a shift away from central direction to local power and control. Setting of economic and social policy should become more localised through a radical shift of powers from Whitehall to town halls. These should be combined with strong local plans and the participation of communities and local businesses in economic decision-making.

Second, a shift in focus from economic growth to living standards. Boosting disposable incomes and enhancing access to social infrastructure would have an immediate impact on people's living standards.

Third, a shift in focus from "high-value-added" sectors to the everyday economy that forms the backbone of local economies and generates the majority of jobs.

Fourth, a shift in focus from large businesses to the small and medium enterprises (SMEs) that form the bedrock of local economies. The vital role of SMEs in local economies is often overlooked despite their accounting for more than half of all private sector jobs.

Fifth, a major shift to green. Improvement in living standards will be only short-lived if is it built on the back of energy-intensive industries that are likely to be stranded within a decade as the world moves towards carbon neutrality. The huge investment that will be required to deliver net zero would also create the opportunity to invest in community infrastructure to create jobs, boost industries and improve neighbourhoods.
